Introduction

About us

Calgary Communities Against Sexual Abuse (CCASA) is the primary sexual harassment, sexual abuse and sexual assault crisis, counselling and education service provider for Calgary and the surrounding areas. We exist to inform, educate, and empower. We are a leader in the field of sexual violence.

For 30 years, CCASA has built a strong foundation and network of services to support communities in addressing sexual violence and the resulting myriad of complex issues for individuals, families and communities. We strive to enhance the health and well being of all people and our broader community through responsible and effective programs in sexual harassment, sexual abuse and sexual assault education, crisis intervention, and counselling.

Our Vision

Healthy communities free of sexual violence, including sexual abuse, sexual assault and sexual harassment.

Our Mission

To lead in the provision of specialized sexual violence services and educate communities to shift attitudes and responses to sexual violence.

Land Acknowledgement

In the spirit of respect and truth, CCASA wishes to take a step towards reconciliation by acknowledging traditional treaty land where we work. CCASA acknowledges the traditional territories of the people of the Treaty 7 region in Southern Alberta, which includes the Blackfoot Confederacy, comprising the Siksika, Piikani, and Kainai First Nations, the Tsuut'ina First Nation, and the Stoney Nakoda (including Chiniki, Bearspaw, and Wesley First Nations). Moh'kins'tsis, named by the Blackfoot, meaning "Where the Bow River meets the Elbow" is also home to the Otipemisiwak Métis Government of the Métis Nation within Alberta Districts 5 and 6. Finally, we acknowledge all Nations – Indigenous and non – who live, work and play on this land, and who honour and celebrate this territory.

Message from Leadership

As we reflect on 2023, Calgary Communities Against Sexual Abuse (CCASA) has experienced a year of significant achievements and continued resilience. The implementation of our new Business Plan set the stage for a successful year, with senior staff meeting the goals outlined in our Operational Plan. The results from our annual staff survey were exceptionally positive, revealing that our team feels supported, well-directed, and equipped with the necessary resources and training to perform their roles effectively.

A notable accomplishment this year was our collaboration with Luna Child Advocacy Centre, through which we conducted an exploratory project to examine and streamline our services, ensuring no duplication and clear delineation for our clients. This initiative not only clarified roles for our staff but also enhanced our service delivery.

In 2023, funding for sexual assault centres was prioritized by both major political parties in their election promises. Although the anticipated government funding had not materialized by the end of the year, we received temporary one-year funding starting April 1, 2023, to address counselling waitlists across the province. We remain deeply grateful for the ongoing financial support from the United Way of Calgary and area, the Ministries of Health (now under the Mental Health and Addiction Ministry), Alberta Community and Social Services (now under Children and Family Services), and Alberta Justice and Solicitor General – Victims of Crime Fund. Unfortunately, after more than 30 years, our funding from the City of Calgary Family and Community Support Services was terminated on March 31, 2023. Nevertheless, we successfully secured the City of Calgary's Safe Communities Investment Funds for one year, ensuring the continuation of our crisis services.



Message from Leadership

Our Board Governance saw significant activity as we recruited seven new board members, expanding our board size as stipulated in our bylaws. This new group began collaborating in the fall of 2023, bringing fresh perspectives and energy to our governance framework. Internally, we restructured to create a new role, Assistant Director of Clinical Services, to work closely with the Director of Clinical Services. This addition has stabilized and strengthened our clinical services, contributing to a high level of staff stability throughout the year. Recognizing the challenges of trauma work, we strive to provide competitive salaries, a flexible work environment, excellent supervision, and creative benefits to support our dedicated staff. This year, we saw fewer openings and more success in maintaining a full complement of staff.

Financially, 2023 was stable for CCASA. We continue to benefit from ongoing contracts with funders, along with increased donations and revenue from our education and training services.

Reflecting on the year, we are proud of our accomplishments and the unwavering dedication of our staff, volunteers and board members. As we look forward to the future, we remain committed to advocating for those experiencing sexual violence, improving our services, and fostering a supportive environment for our team and clients.

Calgary Sexual Assault Response Team (CSART)

The Calgary Sexual Assault Response Team (CSART) provides specialized care to individuals who have been sexually assaulted within the last 168 hours. The team operates primarily out of their specialized facilities in the Sheldon Chumir Health Centre. This service is available 24/7 to anyone 14 years of age or older who has experienced a sexual assault. Children 13 years old and younger can access CSART services at the Alberta Children's Hospital.



Highlights

#ASKFORIT

CCASA sought to strengthen its outreach and community engagement efforts. In our pursuit, we found kindred spirits in two local enterprises: VOTO, a dynamic BIPOC women-owned tech startup, and Xhale Brewery, a woman-owned gem in the city's craft beer scene that championed harm reduction. embarked on a mission to create something extraordinary—a custom beer that would not only tantalize taste buds but also ignite conversations about consent and awareness. Thus, the #AskForltCampaign was conceived. This unique brew was set to be the catalyst for change, a tangible reminder of the power of unity and collaboration.



MURAL

CCASA's education team collaborated with a local artist, Emily Chu from Edmonton. She designed and created multiple materials for child and youth education, including educational 'zines for the youth program "Birch Grove". The 'zines discuss topics such as bystander intervention, supporting ourselves and others, and the sexual violence pyramid (depicted as a tree).

Lastly, Emily worked with TREC leadership to design a mural, which was installed in the CCASA training room over the summer. The mural depicts a geographical image of Calgary and the surrounding areas, representing the variety of communities we serve.



Highlights

Youth Advisory Committee (YAC)

CCASA completed its first year of having a Youth Advisory Committee (YAC). One of the suggested that YAC members participate in The Canadian Library (TCL), a grassroots art installation project that acts as a all Missing and Murdered memorial to Indigenous Women, Girls (MMIWG2S), and Children. In May, CCASA staff came together as a team to learn and reflect on the issue of MMIWG2S. CCASA staff wrapped over 100 books in Indigenous fabric with the names of MMIWG2S ironed on the spines of the books. This art installation now resides in CCASA's training room. The event encouraged many emotions, learning, and dialogue for CCASA staff. At CCASA, we know that Indigenous women and children are disproportionately impacted by violence, including sexual violence, so it is important that we do our part to work towards Truth and Reconciliation.



Trans Affirming Network

CCASA partnered with the Skipping Stone Foundation to become the first full social service organization in Calgary to join their Trans Affirming Network of organizations and businesses who commit to creating spaces that are welcoming, respectful, and inclusive of transgender and gender diverse folks.




