


CCASA offers specialized short, to mid-term crisis intervention and individual counselling to people of all genders, twelve years of age and over who have been affected by sexual abuse, sexual assault and/ or sexual harassment. Both individual and group counselling are offered. Individual counselling is provided Monday to Friday, during the day, with evening hours available on Tuesdays. Group counselling is primarily offered in the evenings.

CCASA is committed to helping individuals who have been affected by sexual violence as well as their support persons and is committed to engaging communities to change attitudes around this crime.

Crisis Intervention and Counselling

CCASA offers specialized short term crisis intervention and support counselling to people of all genders, twelve years of age and over who have been affected by sexual abuse, sexual assault and/or sexual harassment. Both individual and group counselling are offered. Individual counselling is offered Monday to Friday, during the day, with evening hours available on Tuesdays. Group counselling is primarily offered in the evenings.

Crisis intervention and support counselling include conducting assessments and implementing interventions that assist in developing healthy coping strategies and in reducing the impact of trauma. Risk assessments and interventions also address safety concerns related to perpetrator(s), suicide, domestic violence, and children at risk when appropriate. In addition, relevant psycho-educational information is provided to clients in order to validate and normalize their experiences thereby reducing the stigma associated with sexual assault and sexual abuse. Some clients of CCASA address their presenting issues within their session limit; however, for those who require longer term counselling, CCASA serves as a bridge to individuals while they wait to access long-term services. CCASA provides both individual and group counselling to clients, as each mode addresses differing needs of clients and are often appropriate at different times in the process of healing.

Issues in individual and group counselling relate to isolation, fears, anxiety; flashbacks and intrusive memories; difficulties with concentration and anger; depression and suicidal thoughts/actions; sleep disorders; nightmares; difficulties with trust; issues of grief and loss; lowered self-esteem; intense feelings of guilt and shame; issues related to body image, addiction, and sexuality, as well as relationship difficulties. Group counselling also provides survivors an opportunity to move out of the isolation many survivors experience as a result of sexual abuse.

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Support and Information Line

The CCASA Support and Information Line is the hub of our organization in many ways. It is the entry point to all of the programs within CCASA including counselling, education requests, recent sexual assault accompaniment, and police and court support. It is a specialized telephone line available for use by anyone in Calgary and the surrounding area who: 1) requires information regarding sexual assault/abuse/harassment, 2) is in crisis as a result of recent or past sexual assault/abuse/harassment, or 3) requires a referral for services. CCASA receives approximately 80-90% of its calls during office hours. Calls often become extensive crisis intervention calls and/or intake assessments which are completed with those individuals that are requesting counselling from the agency. Any individual who has access to a telephone is able to use the Support and Information Line.

CCASA staff members and volunteers are trained in crisis intervention skills and in safety, suicide, domestic violence, and child welfare risk assessments. The line offers information on reporting options to survivors, and referrals to a wide range of services in the Calgary area. Family or friends of survivors use the line for their own support and to obtain information or referrals for their loved one. In addition, professionals (teachers, police officers, victim services, counsellors, students) use the line to obtain information about sexual violence and for consultation purposes.

The Support and Information Line continued to be a vital aspect of our service delivery during 2015 remained very busy. More than 8000 calls were received on the line this year of which around 6000 were administrative calls and around 2000 were support/crisis calls. Both are significant increases from 2014. Over 600 intakes were completed on the Support and Information line during this time and roughly 545 hours (32,000 minutes) were spent answering support line calls.

In late 2015 major changes were made to the operation of the Support and Information Line. In an effort to ensure CCASA's resources are being utilized most effectively, CCASA made the decision to adjust the operating hours of the Support and Information Line. For over 20 years, CCASA has offered this line as a 24 hour service; however, over the last few years we have been monitoring the number of calls received and have observed that although call volume remains high during daytime hours, there are very few calls received overnight.

As a result of these changes The Support and Information Line is now available: Monday to Thursday 9:00am to 9:00pm; Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and stat holidays 9:00am to 5:00pm. Staff at CCASA continue to answer the line during office hours which are Monday to Friday 9:00am to 5:00pm and CCASA volunteers are responsible to answer the line outside of those hours.

Sexual Assault Response Team (SART)

The Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) is a collaborative partnership between CCASA, Alberta Health Services, Calgary Police Services, RCMP, and the Crown Prosecutor's Office that specializes in providing a comprehensive and coordinated response to individuals who have experienced a sexual assault within the past 96 hours.

The program is based primarily out of the Alberta Health Services, Sheldon Chumir Health Centre and is mobile to other hospitals within Calgary. CCASA's role on the team is to provide information to clients (as well as their support people) on sexual assault trauma and recovery in order to normalize their symptoms and assist them in the process of healing. CCASA staff also provide crisis intervention, risk assessments, safety planning, and advocacy as well as exploring clients' needs in terms of follow-up services from CCASA and other community services. After one to three days, CCASA will follow up with each client to reassess their ongoing needs.

In 2015 decision was made by all SART partners to increase the window of time in which SART responds to a sexual assault from 72 to 96 hours. Individuals who have experienced a sexual assault often require time to process what has happened and to make a decision with respect to whether or not they are interested and ready to access services for themselves. Forensic evidence can still be collected in some cases within 96 hours, and as clients' medical and emotional needs can also be addressed within this time span, the team determined it was important to increase the response time to better meet client needs.

SART remained a widely used service 2015 with the team attending over 250 hospital accompaniments. Of those the majority of clients (95%) were female and around 86% percent of all clients were adults (18 years of age or older). In addition to theese clients who used SART as recent victims of sexual assault, over 200 secondary clients were served through this program. These individuals are those who accompanied their loved one, the survivor of sexual assault, to the hospital. These individuals are commonly traumatized by the sexual assault and are also in need of information, support and sometimes referrals of their own. In total CCASA staff provided over 1000 hours of support crisis counselling and information for SART. The team continued to show positive results with 85% of cases showing a deescalation in crisis, 88% of clients being able to identify resources and next steps by the end of the interaction and in 94% of the cases where a safety risk was indicated a safety plan was successfully created.

Through the recognition of the importance of providing trauma informed care to patients, CCASA has continued to be invited to take part in the training that new nurses and physicians joining SART are expected to attend. In collaboration with the SART nurses, CCASA delivered several presentations in 2015 to new emergency and urgent care nurses at hospitals and urgent care centers throughout Calgary.

Police and Court Education and Support (PACES)

For many individuals who have experienced sexual abuse or sexual assault, choosing to engage in the criminal or civil legal systems is often a difficult and overwhelming decision. The system is full of language and lengthy processes that are unfamiliar to most people.

Our PACES program provides comprehensive and specialized information, education, support and advocacy for individuals affected by sexual abuse and sexual assault who are contemplating involvement or are involved in the legal system.

Our PACES staff provide direct services which include crisis support, assisting with victim impact statements, accompanying clients to Police and Crown interviews, liaising with members of the criminal justice system, helping with financial benefits and restitution applications, giving information on system processes, providing post-court follow-up and making the appropriate referrals.

In 2015 the PACES maintained a steady active client list including which resulted in over 1700 direct contacts with clients of which 1300 were instances where emotional support was provided and over 500 contained risk assessment and safety planning. Of the active client list there were 111 new client cases. In addition the PACES staff participated in 167 police/court/crown accompaniments.

Individual Counselling

CCASA offers individual specialized counselling for individuals impacted by sexual abuse and sexual assault for up to 18 sessions. Counselling at CCASA is a free service and services include assisting the survivor and loved ones in dealing effectively with the acute stage effects of sexual abuse crisis (whether past or recent). This includes helping people work through and face the many issues that without intervention could result in many difficulties both in their present lives and in the future. The program covers immediate impact, emotional and behavioural reactions and also addresses practical issues the individual may be dealing with at the time.

Potential topics and issues addressed in the individual sessions are: information on sexual abuse and sexual assault, sexual violence and its social context, anger, depression, trust, grief and loss, self esteem, assertiveness, guilt and shame, body image, sexuality, power and control. CCASA also provides addiction counselling through the Aventa Treatment Centre.

In 2015 CCASA provided over 3500 hours of individual counselling encompassing 900 new and continuing clients. In addition over 650 new intakes were completed and of the sessions provided over 700 (roughly 20%) were conducted at our satellite offices at the Sheldon Chumir Health Centre (508), the Aventa Treatment Centre (117) and in Okotoks (83). Individual counselling at CCASA continued to show positive outcomes in 2015 with 98% of clients reporting validation by their counsellor and 88 % of clients reporting an increased understanding of the effects of sexual abuse/assault. In addition 76% of clients showed reduced scores on the Trauma Symptom Checklist after attending counselling sessions.

Group Counselling

Group counselling offers survivors of sexual abuse and sexual assault support and counselling in a group setting. It is offered in the evening, once a week for two hours, over an eleven-week period.

The groups are for either men or women; we do not offer mixed groups.

Over the years the group counselling have included:

- Adult female survivors of childhood sexual abuse.
- · Adult female survivors of sexual assault.
- Adult female survivors of childhood sexual abuse who have also experienced domestic violence in their adult relationship(s).
- · Male survivors of childhood sexual abuse.
- · Male survivors of sexual violence.

In 2015 CCASA ran an eleven week adult female childhood sexual abuse group in the spring of 2015 and began a second adult female childhood sexual abuse group in the fall of 2015.

CCASA has also begun the development of an introductory group The current groups offered by CCASA are highly process oriented and geared toward later stages of healing. Due to the nature of these types of groups, eligibility criteria require potential clients to have accessed individual and/or group counselling regarding their histories of abuse prior to being accepted into group. As group counselling can be a powerful mode of healing, CCASA identified a need to expand this service to include individuals who are at earlier stages in their healing process. CCASA aims to complete the development of this group and pilot it in 2017.

Camp Chief Hector

CCASA once again was able to collaborate with the YWCA Camp Chief Hector to provide a weekend of celebration honoring personal growth, and healing for female survivors of sexual abuse and sexual assault who have attended individual and/or group counselling sessions at CCASA. The weekend, which took place in the Fall of 2015 was attended by 8 participants this year highlights and celebrates women's strength and empowerment in a structured format that includes activities such as group sharing sessions, a high ropes course, horseback riding, and relaxation sessions.

This is a weekend that holds a great deal of importance to our staff and we hope to be able to continue this weekend for many years to come.



Education and Outreach

CCASA's education and outreach program strives to inform the public and empower individuals throughout the community by providing accessible, ethical, accurate and relevant education and preventative programs that address sexual violence and its surrounding issues.

These programs are based on the specific needs of diverse populations existing throughout Calgary and area. They promote a philosophy of integrating healthy relationships with accurate information on specific sexual abuse and sexual assault issues and presents this with a non-threatening and non-judgmental approach.

Through effective outreach we seek to build cooperative and mutually supportive relationships with community groups and organizations to raise awareness of sexual abuse and sexual assault.

The types of programs offered include: awareness for students, teachers, administrators and parents, community presentations tailored to the needs of the particular group requesting the presentation, and training sessions to police, hospital and social service agencies specifically tailored to suit their informational needs.

A child sexual abuse program is vital for the health and safety of every community, and every person has a role to play in keeping our children safe.

CCASA's child sexual abuse safety program "Who Do You Tell?" ("WDYT?" is delivered in Public, Catholic, Muslim and Jewish schools within Calgary. Using a three pronged approach by educating children, parents and teachers, the curriculum empowers adults to address the issues related to child sexual abuse in a safe, compassionate and energizing format.

Striving to provide the highest quality programs in our community that support best practice research, CCASA has been working to create a new and expanded "WDYT?"TM Program. This program includes original core curriculum components as well as new learning objectives which are aligned with those outlined by the Alberta Education Health and Life Skills Curriculum. Expanded curriculum has been developed for grades one and two and is now being offered in all schools that receive "WDYT?"TM.

The number of "WDYT?" presentations at each school has increased and as a result the relationships between the program educators and the students has strengthened, making it more likely that students will identify educators as someone they can talk to about abuse they have experienced.

In 2015 the members of the Education and Outreach Team each expanded their individual roles to include involvement in the "Who Do You Tell?" TM Program. The creation of dedicated two-person teams has also allowed CCASA to provide more consistent and efficient delivery of this vital program.

Community Outreach

CCASA's Community Outreach consists of a variety of educational presentations, awareness raising booths and various other community activities which help to educate Calgary communities and surrounding areas about the issues of sexual abuse and sexual assault in addition to helping to create a better understanding of the various aspects of these issues including consent, harassment and the importance of inclusive language to name just a few.

2015 saw continued growth and expansion within our community outreach which included an extensive training initiative presented to the staff at Calgary Transit, multiple awareness raising booths for the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services' "I Believe You" campaign and a partnership with SAIT to help develop their sexual assault policy among many other public booths and presentations.

"ManEnough?"TM Program

CCASA's male engagement program began in 2013 and has since become an important aspect of our education and outreach service delivery. In 2015 we continued to market the "ManEnough?" TM Program throughout the community. In total 4 "ManEnough?" information sessions were held in 2015 along with 5 Men's engagement events for a total of around 100 participants attending to hear about the program and its subject matter."ManEnough?" continues to be a growing within CCASA's education and outreach and we continue to look for ways to market this program to our community. We are excited to have another full group session scheduled to take place beginning in March 2016.



Ethno-Cultural Communities

A Sexual Assault Worker/Educator has been hired to work with ethnoculturally diverse community groups and organizations to raise awareness about the issues of sexual abuse and assault. This reporting period the new staff member has been focusing on training to ensure she is prepared to act as a sexual violence expert within diverse communities.

Raising awareness about sexual violence within diverse communities requires a multifaceted approach. An initial work plan has been developed for addressing the issue of child sexual abuse which includes activities such as relationship building with existing diversity serving agencies, exploration of the ways in which we can connect the issue of child sexual abuse with programs that are already engaging diverse communities, and the development of a culturally sensitive child sexual abuse workshop.

A CCASA child sexual abuse workshop titled Finally Parents are Talking has been modified to include culturally relevant information for parents within diverse communities. CCASA has been working with the coordinator of an existing parent group at Punjabi Community Health Services Calgary to set a date to pilot this workshop. CCASA educators working specifically within diverse communities also plan to facilitate internal capacity building opportunities for the Education and Outreach team, ensuring that all educators are better prepared to respond to culturally specific questions and/or concerns.

Partnership with SAIT

A sexual assault policy is crucial for any post secondary institution and in 2015 CCASA entered into a partnership with SAIT to help them draft their new campus sexual assault policy. In addition the partnership saw increased resource sharing between CCASA and SAIT.

This partnership aims to provide and number of benefits to both SAIT and CCASA including: education to SAIT employees, expertise to SAIT in drafting a sexual assault policy, counselling support to augment SAIT's own professional counselling staff, an off-campus resource for students who wish to access service at an alternate location and a way for CCASA to reach more people with the important message that violence is not acceptable, and that help is available.

Survivors who get a positive response when they tell someone are more likely to get help and seek justice. That makes our communities healthier and safer for everyone.



Calgary Transit Training

In 2015 CCASA had the unique opportunity to work with Calgary Transit to provide education to their staff around the issues of sexual assault and sexual harassment.

CCASA was approached by Calgary Transit to assist in addressing issues of sexual harassment and sexual assault experienced by individuals while accessing transit. CCASA subsequently developed a training specifically geared to the needs of Calgary Transit Peace Officers with a focus on increasing the knowledge and skills of Calgary Transit staff to respond to disclosures of abuse and harassment. All Calgary Transit Peace Officers attended the training in weekly small group sessions between October 2015 and January 2016.

As a result of this successful initiative, Calgary Transit representatives have once again reached out to CCASA and requested similar training for the staff who answer the Transit Watch helpline as well as manage the security cameras and dispatch of peace officers. CCASA is currently working to revamp the existing training to meet the specific needs of this group.



Education / Community Outreach 2015 Highlights

CCASA hosted 22 booths at which contact was made with over 2000 community members and roughly 60 disclosures were taken

Over 700 presentations were given in 2015 including:

- 650 "WDYT?"TM presentations with over 2900 participants
- 11 "WDYT" Teacher and Parent In-services with over 170 and 280 participants respectively
- 16 junior high school presentations for over 600 participants
- 22 presentations for community members with over 400 participants
- 24 presentations for professional with over 250 participants

CCASA's Education and Outreach Program has grown in both scope and reach in the past year and we are looking forward to continued success and expansion of our service delivery into 2016.

Calgary Comic and Entrainment Expo: Expo Equality Initiative

CCASA was asked back in 2015 by the Calgary Comic and Entertainment Expo to partner in their consent campaign. The campaign was expanded from 'Cosplay Does Not Equal Consent' and re-branded as 'Expo Equality'.

The campaign was adapted to promote the general values of respect and kindness when interacting with other Expo attendees while maintain the component of promoting consent and taking zero tolerance policy against harassment or assault.

In addition to running a booth again during the Expo weekend in April of 2015. CCASA also provided a 1-day training for Expo staff to talk about how to effectively respond to disclosures of harassment and assault. During the course of the weekend the booth was attended by over 600 people and both CCASA's presence and the training were widely appreciated. CCASA was asked back for the 2016 Expo and we are excited about the continued growth of this partnership moving forward.



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CCASA Online

In a world that is growing increasingly digital it is important to establish an online presence. The use of social media and a well designed website has become crucial to raising awareness about the services we offer and the importance of this issue.

CCASA has been committed to raising our online profile within our community over the past number of years through increased social media activity and presence along with a commitment to establishing an online brand that is clear and consistent.

We continued to see steady growth in 2015 on our social media platforms through audience growth in both number and participation along with steady progress in the number of visits to our website calgarycasa.com

Volunteer Program

CCASA recognizes, appreciates and values the contribution of our volunteers and what they give to our agency. Volunteer contributions are an invaluable source of support and strength in providing quality sexual abuse and sexual assault services. They have an important role in our organization and are integrated into our program and service delivery where possible.

Over the past three years the volunteers have taken on a major role in helping to operate our Support and Information Line. In order to do this CCASA volunteers are required to complete extensive specialized training to be prepared to respond effectively to the clientele or community members when working on the Line or supporting a CCASA initiative. Our volunteers also actively participate in educational booths, help deliver presentations to various members of the community, and participate in community partner events.

Throughout 2015 the volunteer program remained strong and active with 90 people volunteering throughout the year. CCASA also held 3 rounds of volunteer training throughout the year each lasting 30 hours and the volunteer base handled over **2000 Support and Information Line shift hours** taking calls to support **hundreds of individuals** impacted by sexual violence. We hope to continue this momentum throughout 2016 and maintain a strong volunteer program which supports our services in a variety of ways.

2015 also saw the introduction of Volunteer Lead Positions which were given to a small number of established volunteers who took on increased responsibility in mentoring new volunteers, helping to support other volunteers on Support Line shifts and working more closely with the Community Engagement and Volunteer Coordinator to provide feedback on phone shifts and volunteer activities.


